MISSION

Mellow is a pioneering East London-based NHS programme committed to improving the experience of African and Caribbean people with mental health problems & promoting their well-being within the community.

PROJECT PROFILE

Mellow was launched in 2000 to reduce the over-representation of young African and Caribbean men in mental health services in East London. As well as developing alternative and sustainable responses to mental distress, Mellow successfully works in partnership with statutory, voluntary and arts-based agencies nationwide, both as a facilitator and a consultancy. With an expanded brief targeting the wider community, Mellow became part of the East London & City Mental Health NHS Trust in April 2004. The award-winning project is central to the Trust's cultural diversity and race equality programme.

KEY AIMS

- Improve the experiences of African and Caribbean mental health clients to achieve greater control over their lives.
- Support East London statutory mental health services to implement the Developing Race Equality (DRE) programme.
- Increase client participation in service design, delivery and evaluation.
- Provide training, information and support enabling mental health practitioners to deliver services responsive to the needs of African and Caribbean clients.
- Encourage, promote and develop community-based programmes that develop the African and Caribbean clients' potential.
- Facilitate and support community groups to address well-being within African and Caribbean communities.

SERVICES

CAPACITY BUILDING

We endeavour to increase the ability of mental health professionals, and voluntary and community groups, to assess and target their activities to meet the needs of African and Caribbean people vulnerable to or experiencing mental ill health.

Consultancy

We provide facilitated consultancy on service development, professional mentoring and line management support.

Specialist Information and Resources We produce training videos, specialist directories, fact sheets and commission original research.

Tailored Training

Our training is developed and delivered using a range of interactive tools from drama, performance poetry and art to seminars and workshops.

CASE STUDY

4SIGHT A MELLOW DRAMA



In 2005. Mellow was commissioned by the London Borough of Hackney to develop a training programme to enhance staff understanding of how discrimination impacted on BME mental health clients and the legal framework in which they worked. Mellow held focus groups for clients and staff. Among the issues raised were staff attitudes towards clients and the promotion of clients in recovery as role models. The result was 4Sight, a three-day dramaassisted training programme to increase awareness and create change. Such was the programme's success that it will be rolled out across East London.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

We create activities and programmes that increase awareness and understanding of mental illness within the wider community. Our flexible approach encourages greater community participation and ownership of the mental health agenda and services.

What we offer

Stereohype

A quarterly mental health promotion initiative that promotes the well-being of African and Caribbean men through the Arts.

Unbreakable Project

Raises awareness of mental health in the Somali community and promotes community inclusion through a variety of mediums such digital and new media facilitated by Black Flash Media.

Early Intervention Programme

Each One Teach One was launched in October 2005 with the Harmony Project. Organises training and events to promote earlier intervention in mental health for young Black men.

CASE STUDY

STEREOHYPE

First launched in the City & Hackney locality in February 2003, Stereohype is a quarterly mental health promotion event that constructively challenges the stigma Black men with mental health problems face. Hosted within creative, artistic and 'safe' environments, clients and service users debate topical concerns and showcase their talents alongside established artists. Nearly 600 people, including carers, teachers, youth workers and mental health staff, have attended seven events. Around 40% of attendees have been service users. South Lambeth and Maudsley Mental Health Trust has commissioned Mellow to run the programme in Lambeth.

CASE STUDY

DEADLY SILENCE

Delivered in Birmingham on 6th October 2004, Deadly Silence was a carefully crafted drama tool, targeted at PCT and Mental Health Trust board members in the West Midlands. Developed in consultation with local clients and survivors, the one-day event attracted over 100 delegates to explore Delivering Race Equality. The play tackled a range of real-life dilemmas on racism, control and restraint, and cultural sensitivity backed by presentations, workshops and round table discussions. Over 90% of those surveyed after the event said that the topics were very appropriate.

CASE STUDY

I MENT U

This new mentoring project, provides community-based support and befriending services to young African and Caribbean men aged 13 to 20 who have had contact with CAMHS, youth offending teams or leaving care services. A partnership between Mellow and Rethink, the project covers three East London Boroughs – Hackney, Tower Hamlets and Newham. After an extensive matching process, volunteer mentors are recruited and trained to facilitate the 'mentees' through the transition from social care to independent living.
