Some reasons why we should trace our family tree.

- 1. Identify hereditary diseases and genetic disorders (e.g. Sickle Cell).
- 2. Learning about family history, folklore, custom and heritage is fun and can bridge the generation gap.
- Give a sense of identity and purpose in planning personal objectives and career developments knowing that you have a family tradition or heritage.
- 4. Identify role models from within families for a source of inspiration and encouragement.
- 5. Recognition of family ancestors who made a contribution to the local community, nationally and internationally.

First steps in Recording Your Family History

- Start with yourself and work backwards through the generations. You
 can make a start by using the inside chart to begin recording your
 ancestors. Speak to family members and record their memories before
 it is too late. Keeping in mind that family stories can be embellished
 over the years, sometimes bearing very little resemblance to reality.
- All this can only take you so far before resorting to documentary
 evidence in the form of birth, marriage and death certificates, diaries,
 school reports, property deeds etc. Then there are official records held
 in archives and libraries held in this country and overseas
- Many records have now been digitised and made available via the
 internet. These on line sources don't contain everything so be prepared
 to visit archives and record offices. They are many good books on how
 to start recording a family history and your local library may be able to
 help.

Genealogical research is the process by which historical records and genetic analysis are used to determine kinship or family connections.
